SOLEMN EUCHARIST | 7 PM with the Washing of Feet and Stripping of the Altar

The Triduum

The Paschal Triduum is the three-day period starting with sundown on Maundy Thursday through Easter Day.

The Triduum begins with Maundy Thursday. The liturgy from *The Book of Common Prayer* recalls the Last Supper and institution of the eucharist from Matthew, Mark, and Luke. It also includes a foot-washing ceremony that recalls John's Last Supper story in which he washes the feet of the disciples after the meal. It is from John's Gospel that we get the "New Commandment," from which we get the word Maundy - from Latin word Mandatum which means commandment.

Good Friday remembers when Christ was crucified and died. The liturgy comes from the ancient service used on days when the Eucharist was not celebrated. This liturgy begins with the collect (prayer) and readings, then moves to the solemn collects (from the old Roman form of the Prayers of the People). The liturgy of the word then moves into the veneration of the cross. While no celebration of communion may take place on Good Friday, communion may still be offered from the reserved sacrament (bread and wine consecrated before).

Holy Saturday is the day when Christ is dead in the tomb and descended to the dead. Liturgical celebration for this day is sparse to represent that Christ is dead.

The Great Vigil of Easter is celebrated the night before Easter Day. It is the high point of the Paschal Triduum. The vigil begins with the lighting of the new Easter fire and reading God's saving acts, then continues with the baptism of candidates, or reaffirmation of baptism promises, and asperging with holy water.

Easter Day is both the last day of the Triduum and the first of the 50-day celebration of Christ's resurrection.

Tonight

The Maundy Thursday rite commemorates Jesus' last hours with his disciples. Before the service, our community gathers for a light meal to remember the context of Jesus's supper with his friends. The two primary emphases of the liturgy are the Institution of the Lord's Supper, or Eucharist, and the "Maundy" (for commandment or mandatum) - the washing of feet with its attendant commandment to love one another. This is the last celebration of the Eucharist before the Great Vigil of Easter on Saturday night. At the end of the liturgy, the Altar is stripped and washed. You are invited to participate in our Maundy Thursday vigil following the service.



The Collect of the Day

Almighty Father, whose dear Son, on the night before he suffered, instituted the Sacrament of his Body and Blood: Mercifully grant that we may receive it thankfully in remembrance of Jesus Christ our Lord, who in these holy mysteries gives us a pledge of eternal life; and who now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The People sit.

The First Lesson Exodus 12:1-14

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take

some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the Lord. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the Lord. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.

This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.



The Gospel

John 13:1-17, 31b-35

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord--and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

"Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."







Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:


Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.


Sharing of the Gifts of God



MARCH 30 | Holy Saturday

8am The Great Vigil of Easter

The Great Vigil of Easter is one of the oldest known rites of the Christian church, dating back to the second century. It brings worshippers—literally and symbolically—from darkness into light. This symbol-rich liturgy features the lighting of the Pascal fire; readings, psalms and canticles by candle light; renewal of our Baptismal vows; the First Eucharist of Easter; and music and hymns for congregation and choir.

The service comprises four parts:

The Service of Light (kindling of new fire, lighting the Paschal candle, the Exsultet)
The Service of Lessons (readings from the Hebrew Scriptures interspersed with
psalms, canticles, and prayers)

Renewal of Baptismal Vows

Holy Eucharist

A light reception follows the service, in the Fortune Room.

MARCH 31 | Easter Day
